KRYS PROTOGRAP

It's time to prepare for the holidays - Christmas, Hanukkah, and New Years. The main subjects are family and friends. I run this article every December because I think this is a good time for a review.

For candid shots make certain you're prepared -- have your camera ready and watch the subject for the expression you want. If you aren't ready the shot will be gone before you press the shutter. Most holiday shots will be taken indoors so don't forget to use your camera's flash.

For portraits and group shots get yourself set up first, and then prepare your subject. If you keep them waiting you will not get a natural relaxed image. For portraits choose a background that's festive, but not too busy. Have your subject(s) turn their shoulders slightly so they are not too square to the camera.

When photographing grandchildren or pets try to get eve level with them, rather than shooting down at them.

I also like to photograph the festive holiday decorations. These often make fun shots and they can be used on your holiday cards next year.

Don't forget the rule of thirds (also from a previous photo tip). Rather than placing your subjects in front of the Christmas tree, move them slightly to one side. If shooting the dinner table set for the holiday feast, have the host stand at one side of the table about 1/3 of the way from the end, rather than centered at the end of the table.

These techniques will help improve your images holiday images. Have a great holiday season, a happy and healthy New Year and remember to have fun with your camera.

NAVIGATING MEDICARE BILLS - NEVER A DULL MOMENT

One common experience we Village Four dwellers share is being near, at, or beyond normal full retirement age, meaning we qualify or nearly qualify for Medicare and Social Security benefits. This article will appear at the end of open enrollment period for benefit year 2022, but it contains timeless cautionary advice based on a recent personal experience.

Like many others, I worked until almost my "full" Social Security/Medicare entitlement age, so I qualify for whatever benefits apply, and that's all fine. Medicare Advantage plans work best for me, because I like the all-in-one model, and God has blessed me [so far] with good enough overall health such that I can get away without supplement plans for lots of expensive add-ons.

I went for my "annual Medicare exam," which is supposed to happen at zero copay. That part of it went through the insurance just fine. A bill arrived via US Mail last week for \$40.00 lab work copay. I expected \$10.00, according to my Medicare third-party insurer booklet for benefit year 2021. The ensuing EOB [Explanation of Benefit] form says the \$40.00 applies because the lab used is out of network for my plan. OK. So I called the Primary care doctor's office asking why the practice chose an out of network lab. The reply? The doctor's database shows that lab in network for my Medicare plan. So it appears labs and other facilities can jump in and out of network throughout a benefit year, without prior written warning. Primary Care Providers and specialists have always warned patients to check before making an appointment, that the practice still participates in your plan.

But the moral of this story? We've come to the miserable point, that it's not enough to ask the doctor each visit whether he/she still accepts your insurance -- it's on you to make a nuisance of yourself and challenge every individual or business that might have anything to do, regardless how tangential, with your health care, do they or do they not accept your Medicare. You can't trust the doctor's office, because they lack enough staff to process the patients in and out the door efficiently, never mind keep up with all the changing statuses of every possible specialist, lab, other health care entity. With all the different Medicare insurers, plans, providers, who's in, who's out at any moment in time, it's a database maintenance nightmare.

I engaged all the right parties in this matter and hope for a favorable outcome. But I'm expert in knowing the game and how it's played. Worst case, I overpay \$30.00. Can you imagine the plight of elderly, not computer savvy, maybe a little demented, hard up for cash seniors in this situation? They would be clueless, unsure where to turn, what to do. It's a miserable situation which will only get worse, as resources are funneled away from senior citizens on Medicare to provide free health care and other giveaways for illegal aliens from who knows where.

Senior Freeze (Property Tax Reimbursement) by Karen Reuther

Recently, I had a conversation with a long-time Member regarding the Senior Freeze Property Tax Reimbursement Program. This is a State program that reimburses eligible senior citizens and disabled persons for the increase in property taxes over a base year.

I was surprised to hear she had never heard of this program, so I thought I'd take a moment and outline the program for those that are not aware.

What you would do is establish your base year based on the eligibility requirements. This is done on a PTR-I form, which you can get by visiting https://www.nj.gov/treasury/taxation/pdf/ptr/ptr20-cp.pdf. Once your base year is established, every year you will be mailed a PTR-2 form. You would need to fill out your portion, have the village office fill out their portion, then mail it in by November Ist. You will then be reimbursed by the State for any increase in property tax over your base year.

To qualify, you must meet all the eligibility requirements for each year from the base year through the application year.

Eligibility Requirements:

- You (or your spouse/civil union partner) would need to be 65 or older on December 31, 2019; **or** actually receiving federal Social Security disability benefit payments (not benefit payments received on behalf of someone else) on or before December 31, 2019.
- Have lived in New Jersey continuously since December 31, 2009, or earlier, as either a homeowner or a renter.
- Have owned and lived in your home since December 31, 2016, or earlier (and you still owned and lived in that home on December 31, 2020).
 - (If you moved from one New Jersey property to another and received a reimbursement for your previous residence for the last full year you lived there, you may qualify for an exception to re-applying to the Senior Freeze Program. Visit Requirements for Resuming Eligibility at https://www.nj.gov/treasury/taxation/ptr/ptr2year.shtml for more information.)
- The 2019 property taxes due on your home must have been paid by June 1, 2020, and the 2020 property taxes must be paid by June 1, 2021.
- Have your total annual income (combined if you were married or in a civil union and lived in the same home):
 - 2019 \$91,505 or less; and
 - 2020 \$92,969 or less

You are not eligible for a reimbursement on:

- A vacation home or second home;
- Are completely exempt from paying property taxes on your home.

The State Budget for FY2022 has been finalized and there were no changes made to the income limit established in the 2020 eligibility requirements.
