With 2021 in the rear view mirror we're looking ahead to how 2022 could possibly top this past year.

Two priority items the board plans to focus on in the upcoming 12 months are:

-RESALES, RESALES, AND MORE RESALES

Village Four sold 70+ units in 2021 that resulted in \$146K in transfer fees and \$42K in administrative fees which helped keep the village financially solid as well as giving the 2022 budget just the nudge we needed to reduce this year's carrying charges (in most cases) and hold them steady for most others. If the 12+ closings in December alone are any indication of how resales could remain high in 2022, then we could be in for another outstanding year for our resales department.

-OUT-OF-THE-BOX ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

2020 and 2021 presented unique challenges for the board to keep residents engaged and occupied in the community and we think we did a pretty good job of hosting many outdoor events and meetings until the clubhouse reopened in August. Once opened, we took up the challenge to bring back as many activities as possible despite losing many long-term volunteers and committee heads. Looking at 2022 we see yet another unique year with all open facilities but less than normal resident participation. The job at hand is for us to offer creative ways to pique the interests of those who have yet to comfortably venture out to enjoy life, while the world around us seems to be forever changing. We are all family and want to offer interesting opportunities for our community to come together like never before.

A BIG thank you to all our residents who dropped off goodies for the office and maintenance this holiday season.

Certain measures are in place providing relief to ratepayers experiencing economic hardship during the COVID-19 pandemic. Please review this message in its entirety. SERVICE SHUTOFF MORATORIUM

BE ADVISED that Executive Order 229 currently prohibits a local government from shutting off water or electric service to a residential customer, or to accounts primarily serving residential customers, due to nonpayment of water, sewer, or electric charges unless the disconnection is to prevent or ameliorate a risk to public health or safety. This shutoff moratorium remains in effect until January 1, 2022.

LATE PAYMENT PENALTY AND LIEN ENFORCEMENT MORATORIUM

BE ADVISED that, until January 1, 2022, Executive Order 229 places a moratorium on local governments enforcing late payment charges and penalties on water or electric accounts, or referring a delinquent water or electric payment to tax sale. On or after January 1, 2022, charges and penalties may be imposed for delinquent payments, and any payments remaining delinquent may be referred to a tax lien sale held by the municipal tax collector.

BILL ASSISTANCE AND ARREARAGE FORGIVENESS PROGRAMS

The New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (DCA) is currently developing a Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP). This program is designed to assist water and sewer customers facing economic hardship due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Further information will be provided once the program goes live.

OPPORTUNITY TO REPAY ARREARAGES IN INSTALLMENTS

BE ADVISED that residents experiencing economic hardship during COVID-19 and who are behind on their water & payments may be eligible to enter into an agreement whereby the resident agrees to pay their arrearages in installments over a period of time. As part of the agreement, the resident must keep up to date on all current charges. 

Happy New Year to YOU, Whatever You Do

Something in human nature causes us to obsesses over the passage of time. If people anywhere within the known universe do NOT practice some tradition marking the end of one yearly cycle and the start of a new one, then I never heard of that cultural group.

New Year celebrations are unique to their country of origin, drawing upon unique objects, cuisines, and rituals. The earliest recorded New Year's festivities date back to ancient Babylon where the first new moon following the vernal equinox marked the start of the new year. Babylonians celebrated with a religious festival called *Akuti*, a multi-day festival that honored the rebirth of the natural world.

Over the years, calendars fell out of sync with the sun, prompting the start of the year to fall on different days until Julius Caesar introduced the so-called Julian calendar in 45 B.C. Caesar instituted January 1st as the first day of the year, and the calendar closely resembled that of the modern Gregorian calendar. Today, most festivities begin on December 31st—the last day of the Gregorian calendar—and continue into the early hours of January 1st.

Whether it's sharing a meal with family and friends or throwing old furniture out the window, each New Year's tradition below derives from a unique origin. Each tries in its own way to create a truly unique representation of its heritage. How many have you heard of before now?

I. Wearing White (Brazil)

In Brazil, the new year is regarded as a time to reflect upon the past and make new resolutions for the coming year. Everyone wears white because the color signifies luck, prosperity, and is meant to ward off bad spirits. As the tradition goes, revelers gather on the beaches, donning white garb where they jump seven waves—a lucky number in Brazilian culture—for good fortune, and throw flowers into the water as an offering to Lemanjá, the goddess of the sea.

2. Spring Festival (China)

The Lunar New Year is the most important holiday in China, and millions around the world celebrate it. Also known as the Spring Festival, this I5-day long celebration has a different date every year, following the Lunar Calendar instead of the Gregorian Calendar. Homes and even cities are lined with red decorations—red symbolizes good luck and good fortune. Red lanterns ward off bad luck and red paper cutouts are hung on walls. Fireworks are set off on both New Year's Eve and again the next morning to ward off negative energy. Children also receive red envelopes that contain money, which is considered a way to symbolically transfer fortune from old people to youth. In addition, there are parades, lion dances, decorative dragon statues, and of course, traditional food.

3. Carrying Suitcases (Colombia)

Colombia boasts an array of New Year's traditions intended to bring fortune and prosperity to those who participate. Partygoers carry empty suitcases at midnight in hopes of inducing a year filled with travel. They also bear money in hand to attract financial security and stability in the coming year. Lentils are believed to bring luck and affluence, so many bake them into their rice or carry them in their pockets.


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4. Smashing Plates (Denmark)

One of the most popular New Year's traditions in Denmark involves smashing plates and old dishes. Danish residents save their unused dinnerware and affectionately shatter them against doors of their families and friends to ward off bad spirits. Other traditions include jumping off chairs at midnight to "leap" into the new year and consuming *Kransekage*, a wreath-shaped cake created using marzipan rings stacked on top of each other with a bottle of wine in the center. The cake is decorated with ornaments and flags.

5. Burning Effigies (Ecuador)

In Ecuador, burning effigies signifies burning the *año viejo*, or "old year." Ecuadorians create large effigies in the likeness of politicians, pop culture figures, and other icons and set them on fire at midnight. It symbolizes the cleansing of bad energy from the previous twelve months and is meant to bring about good fortune.

The tradition originated in 1895, when a yellow fever epidemic hit Guayaquil and forced many to burn coffins packed with clothes of the infected. The tradition has since taken on a more lighthearted, optimistic nature and fills the streets of Ecuador in a celebratory manner today.

6. Festival of Saint Basil (Greece)

The Greek celebration of the New Year is also known as the Festival of Saint Basil. Each year, celebrations take place as a means to attract luck and bring prosperity. An onion, for example, is traditionally hung on the door of homes as a symbol of rebirth, and on New Year's Day, parents wake children by tapping them on the head with the onion. Another customary Greek tradition is consuming *Vasilopita*, or Saint Basil's cake. This cake is baked with a silver or gold coin inside, and whoever finds the coin in their slice is considered especially lucky in the coming year.

7. Rosh Hashanah (Israel)

Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, is celebrated in many countries around the world, especially those with a large Orthodox Jewish population. The holiday takes place in the fall, during the seventh month of the Hebrew calendar. During the night the holiday begins, a festival candle blessing is recited as well as the *Kiddush*, blessing over wine. Those celebrating enjoy apples and other fruits dipped in honey, which symbolizes sweetness and blessings in the coming year. Throughout the celebration of Rosh Hashanah, the Shofar [ram's horn] is sounded. This instrument symbolizes humility standing before God.

8. Oshogatsu (Japan)

Oshogatsu, the Japanese New Year, is one of the most important holidays in Japan. Like other New Year's celebrations, it symbolizes renewal, bidding farewell to problems of the previous year through a variety of customs and celebrations. In December, "year-forgetting parties" known as *Bonekai* take place. On December 31st, Buddhist temples strike their gongs 108 times; each ring representing one of the 108 earthly temptations a person must overcome to achieve nirvana and expel wrong deeds and ill luck of the past year. On New Year's Day, common ways of celebrating the holiday include taking the day off work, wearing traditional kimonos, and consuming soba noodles, which signify longevity. Children receive *otoshidama*, which are small gifts with money inside. Another customary Japanese practice is to send letters to friends and family, which are specially marked to be delivered on January 1st.

9. Watching the Ball Drop (United States)

In addition to the obvious work holiday and late-night partying, New Year's traditions in America derive from a variety of origins and beliefs. After fireworks were banned in New York City in the early 20th century, event organizers arranged to have a 700-pound ball lowered down a pole. Ever since, it's become a tradition to watch the ball start dropping and count down the year's final seconds.

Americans also sing the fine old tune "Auld Lang Syne," which translates to "old long ago" [literally, "old long since" but paraphrased as "for old times' sake]. Originally a Robert Burns poem, the song exactly captures how thoughtful people feel about the rolling years, life's brevity, old friendships. Since 1788, the poem was set to music and spread beyond Scotland and the English-

STREAMLINING THE MAINTENANCE PROCESS

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Snowy Images

The cold weather makes it hard to get motivated to go outdoors and shoot, but there are some great photo opportunities to be had in winter. Make certain you dress for the cold and watch for ice!

Even when there is no snow, icy ponds make great subjects. Look for ducks, geese, or seagulls standing on the ice. Ice makes for great reflection images. Many normal scenes take on a new meaning in winter.

After a snowfall, there are great shots everywhere. The challenge with snow shots is getting the proper exposure. A very bright snowy scene tricks your camera into thinking there is too much light, so the camera will cut back on exposure. This makes the snow in your images look gray. If you know how to set your exposure compensation, increase the exposure by 1 stop to brighten the snow. If your camera has "scene" modes, use the one for snow or beach.

The bare leafless trees make nice silhouette shots and are very good for black and white photography. They are especially effective with a sunrise or sunset behind them.



Thanks to Tom Falkowski, our bookkeeper, who managed the RFP process from start to finish and provided ADP with all the information they needed to help us easily make this change.


NO BULK TRASH

CV4 does NOT pick-up bulk trash as part of our regular bi-weekly trash removal service. Anyone who places large black contractor bags of bulk trash will be charged \$75.00 per bag for our maintenance staff to take it to the Manchester Dump.

Township Dump Permits are free to all residents who have bulk trash to be disposed of and the dump is a close 2 miles from CV4.

There are NO exceptions to this policy as we need everyone's cooperation in keeping our village the beautiful, appealing community it is.

The board specifically asks prospective residents why they want to live in V4 as opposed to another village in Whiting and they all say the grounds and overall beautifully kept homes. Let's all keep it that way!
