

TRUSTEE'S NOTE

BEFORE YOU BAG THOSE BAGS READ THIS...

The May 4th State ban on plastic bags, paper bags, foam cartons and more may not be what you think it is and here are the major take-aways that apply to restaurants and stores ONLY:

- Plastic carryout bags can no longer be given out or sold in any store or restaurant except woven plastic tote bags with stitched handles.
- Paper bags cannot be given out in supermarkets or big-box stores that have grocery sections.

Foam food containers, including clamshell boxes and coffee cups, can no longer be given out by stores or restaurants. The plastic ban applies to all stores regardless of what they sell and the paper bag ban only applies to supermarkets. Any store that is not a supermarket (department store, clothing boutique, electronics store, etc.) can still give out paper bags if they so choose. Plastic straws are available only upon request.

The new law does not stop people from using plastic bags, it only bans stores and restaurants from giving them out so you can still use the plastic garbage bags you normally use and you can still pick up your dog's waste with those same P**P bags you always use.

After May 4th you can still bring your own plastic bags to stores to shop with, unless the store has it's own set of rules.

You can still buy plastic bags as the law targets only carryout bags, not bags for sale.

It's that time of the year again-friendly reminder

With warmer weather coming, the Trustees remind our members that we live squarely in the Central Jersey pine belt, subject to its attendant hazards. For example, our native tree population soon will rain its customary yellow-green pollen down on us, blanketing everything, including garage-parked cars. Local residents know from experience that even people without upper respiratory allergies can suffer allergy symptoms, and this goes on for weeks. We are subject also to "noise pollution" as the local military bases conduct gunnery practice, all part of keeping our democratic republic safe.

My focus in this article is on small pests which many Crestwood Village area residents dismiss as nothing, but may alter your life, not in a good way. These Pine Barrens quite literally crawl with innumerable bugs. Although termites and carpenter ants cause most of the building destruction here, they constitute no immediate human health threat. Four main "creepy-crawlies" affect us: mosquitos, black flies, fleas, and ticks.

Protect yourself from mosquito bites. Use insect repellant with DEET or other effective ingredients.

If you're lucky enough to have a grandchild in your care this Spring and Summer, take care to:

- Dress the child in clothing that covers arms and legs.
- Cover strollers and baby carriers with mosquito netting.
- Use insect repellent on the child, always following label instructions..
- Take steps to control mosquitoes indoors and outdoors.
- Use screens on windows and doors. Repair holes in screens to keep mosquitoes outdoors.
- Use air conditioning, if available.

Stop mosquitoes from laying eggs in or near water.

Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out items that hold water, such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpots, or trash containers. Check for water-holding containers both indoors and outdoors and dump them.

I found out the hard way the same nasty biting flies at the beach find their way to our village. Last summer I was out in my 3-foot area gardening a bit, when I got a bad fly bite. I slapped at and killed the #*!*&#-ing thing, but not before it raised such a welt I had to see a doctor for treatment. I still carry a scar from it. So, consider covering up with long pants, even if it's beastly hot.

Flea bites cause intense itching, and this is generally the worst of it, since the itching and red bite marks fade over time with no long-term health consequences. Yet fleas are known disease and parasite carriers and can induce allergic reactions in more sensitive individuals or pets, so it's vital to be aware of the various diseases they can spread. Flea-borne disease in the United States is rather minor, as compared to the third world. In the USA people get fleas mainly from their infected dogs and cat pets. Fleas threaten your pet's health greatly, so do follow all veterinary recommendations, and change flea collars on schedule. And remember humans can get skin dermatitis from flea saliva, which shows up as itchy bumps or a rash on patches of skin. Also, inhaling flea excrement might cause asthmatic responses in certain persons.

The main tick-borne disease we worry about is Lyme. It is spread by deer (blacklegged ticks) and the Rocky Mountain wood tick. The **s**ymptoms include a rash with a ring of red skin around the tick bite, fever, fatigue, head-ache, and affects the nervous system if not treated on time. When I moved here eight years ago, I brought along my habit of taking long walks, and I acquainted myself with my new home exploring various routes over a 5-mile range in every direction. Neighbors and friends cautioned, "These wooded areas have ticks, so be careful." I brushed it off cavalierly as silly old people alarmism. Long story short – without realizing it, on different occasions ticks got into my unit, and on/into me, even though I thought I was being careful, like checking my clothes thoroughly after having taken short cuts through the woods coming back from Stop and Shop. I did receive at least two tick bites and was put on Doxycycline on two separate occasions as prophylaxis against possible infection.

I know several people who did get Lyme, and even years later they are not doing well. So, take care of yourselves even if you're just gardening a bit in your three-foot area near the unit. Just one bug bite can be life-altering. At our age, we don't need any more "surprises."


