Which reminds me of another topic - Complaints - as previously stated, the office **cannot** accept anonymous complaints. Our staff needs your name and telephone number in the event they have more questions. Your identity will NEVER be shared with anyone outside the office. Bookkeeper's Corner – by Laura L. Dempsey - There are a few items I would like to address in this month's News & Views. The first one is the water and sewer bills residents receive on a quarterly basis from Manchester Township. We have just received the current delinquent list for our Village. Residents were also mailed a delinquent notice as well-if you did receive this notice, please make sure to pay the bill in full to avoid a tax sale which usually takes place in October. If you need assistance with unpaid water and sewer bills and are low-income, the State of NJ is offering assistance-the phone number to apply is NJ211. If your outstanding bill goes unpaid and it is sent to tax sale-the Village pays the unpaid bill and we charge the unpaid amount plus a fee to your homeowners account. Residents should be advised that Manchester Township offers direct debit from your checking account to pay your quarterly water and sewer bill-give them a call and they will send you the form!

The second important item is the annual senior and veteran checks to help offset property taxes. We will be issuing checks to those residents who qualify; and ask that you please be patient as this is a very time-consuming process and we will be working diligently to get all the checks out in a timely fashion. If you are not aware of how this property tax relief works; basically if you are a veteran or a widow of a veteran you can contact Manchester Township to find out how to apply for the veteran deduction. If you are a resident over 65 or disabled with an income of less than \$10,000 not including social security, you should contact Manchester Township to find out how to apply for the senior deduction. All residents who meet the above criteria should take advantage of these deductions that will help with rising food and gas prices.

"Steppin' Out..." In Village Four and Environs... I love walking. As a healthy activity and alternative to driving, walking helps me maintain a healthy lifestyle. For too many of us, the car lured us into a sedentary lifestyle. Why walk when it is so easy to ride there quickly and comfortably? OK, so now more than 80% of adults do not meet aerobic and muscle-strengthening guidelines [this, from the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services].

Because walking comes naturally to humans, we forget that it's not only good exercise but enables us to get where we need to go under our own steam, without having to rely on a vehicle, thus saving gas, wear & tear, plus risk of a tire puncture.

Substituting a walk for driving, older adults can extend the number of years they are able to drive. Medical experts warn that a lack of regular physical activity and the effects of natural aging cause significant muscle loss. With this muscle loss, you could have difficulty walking, getting out of a chair, and driving. Doctors also tell us it's never too late to start an exercise program; even people in their 90s can benefit from walking several times a week.

Beyond better strength and endurance, walking improves balance. Add stretching exercises designed specifically for older adult flexibility, and you gain increased strength, endurance, balance, and flexibility which lower your risk of injury. Overall, this slows down aging in joints and muscles.

For some, walking 30 minutes a day may be difficult. Then walk 10 minutes at a time, three times a day. As your health improves, you can combine two of the three smaller walks into a 20-minute walk, and then advance to a single 30-minute walk. As your daily walk becomes easier, try to include new challenges, such as climbing a hill, extending the time you walk, increasing your walking pace, or adding an additional day of walking.

While any physical activity is good, only frequent exercise brings lasting results. The results you gain from an activity will fade dramatically after 2 weeks, and completely disappear after 2 to 8 months if that activity is not continued. Doctors say that people who walk regularly can often attain better long-term health and suffer fewer injuries than someone who exercises more vigorously because walking has minimal impact on your bones and joints.

Long-term benefits of walking include lower blood pressure, lower cholesterol, strengthened heart and cardiovascular system, increased bone density, improved mental health with general sense of well-being, better sleep, weight loss or maintenance. I'm not making this up or offering my opinion – these are just a few benefits no serious medical practitioner disputes.

Now for the sober/somber part. Let's assume I convinced you to get up, get out, move around, shake it all about, and you start or continue a walking program. People who walk routinely perhaps don't consider the safety aspects of walking. For instance, most injuries to walkers happen when a vehicle hits them because the driver could not see the walker, or neither walker nor driver were paying close enough attention.

Remember this: SEE & BE SEEN!!! Especially at dawn, dusk, and other low-light times or conditions, wear light colors or bright clothing so that you can be easily seen. Fluorescent colors such as blaze orange, hot pink, and day-glow green are ideal in daytime but not helpful at nighttime.

To see and be seen, keep in mind that walkers are at increased risk during Winter. The lower angle of winter sun increases shadows cast by buildings and trees. Decreased daylight, shadows, and nightfall make it difficult to see walkers wearing dark or non-reflective clothing. Now, if you walk at night for fitness or to take "Fido" to the bathroom, DRESS TO BE SEEN BY DRIVERS!! At night even wearing white clothing does not guarantee drivers can see you. When walking at night, use a flashlight to make yourself more visible to drivers and to help light your path. It's also a good idea to wear reflective materials, which give off light when headlights shine on them and can be seen by drivers three times farther than white. Many stores sell walking shoes, jackets, and safety sports equipment featuring "retroreflective" material. Although retroreflective materials are more effective than reflective materials, both are ineffective in daytime. Factor in that too many drivers in the Crestwoods have vision problems like cataracts, glaucoma, macular degeneration, and probably should not drive at all, never mind at night but stubbornly keep at it through the arrogance and denial of human nature.

Other Safety Tips for Walkers: Wear sturdy shoes that will give you proper footing. Use paths and walkways whenever available. If you go to Rite Aid, Dollar Tree, or the local medical offices on foot, some of the lineal distance is paved, but much is not. If you must walk on or near a road, walk facing oncoming traffic, so that both you and the driver can see each other. If there's a smooth stable surface alongside the roadway, that's also a good place to walk—just stay as far to the side as possible and look for oncoming traffic. Cars and other objects can obscure a driver's view. Cars, buses, hedges, or mounds of snow can block a driver's view. Even if a driver has stopped to let you cross the street, don't blindly accept the driver's offer because there may be another vehicle in the next lane overtaking the stopped vehicle. And the second driver can't see you because of the stopped vehicle.

Don't rely only on traffic signs and signals. The way old drivers and dump truck operators tear-ass along Route 70, DO NOT assume red lights will stop traffic. You must look for traffic even if you are in a crosswalk and you are crossing with the light or with the walk signal. A driver who does not see or obey a sign or signal cares nothing for your safety.

Allow plenty of time to cross streets. If you're not sure how long a signal gives you to cross, observe one light cycle so you'll know how much time you have. If the signal does not provide enough time, find another place to cross the street. Otherwise, wait for a "fresh green." before crossing.

Intersections are especially difficult for older pedestrians. You are most at risk when first stepping off the curb, because drivers may not see you until you're actually in the roadway. Always stop at the curb and look left, right, then left again for cars before entering the roadway. Don't assume the drivers see you. Walking with a friend will add to the pleasure of your walk and increase your safety as well, like the "buddy system" for swimming. Enjoy your conversation, but don't let it distract you from watching out for road and traffic hazards as you walk. Parking lots create special hazards because cars may be turning quickly or backing out of a parking space. Be sure to look for backup lights and listen for engine noise.

As adults age, gradual losses in their hearing, vision, reflexes, and flexibility put older pedestrians at risk. For instance, stiff joints may make it harder to turn your head, neck, and shoulders and you may not see vehicles that are turning or backing up. So, turn your whole body, not just your neck, when looking for traffic.

Whatever your age, remember it is not too late to reverse the effects of time. Walking is a good place to start, giving you increased strength and stamina to help you get greater enjoyment out of life. Just be careful. We need your monthly carrying charge checks to keep rolling in.

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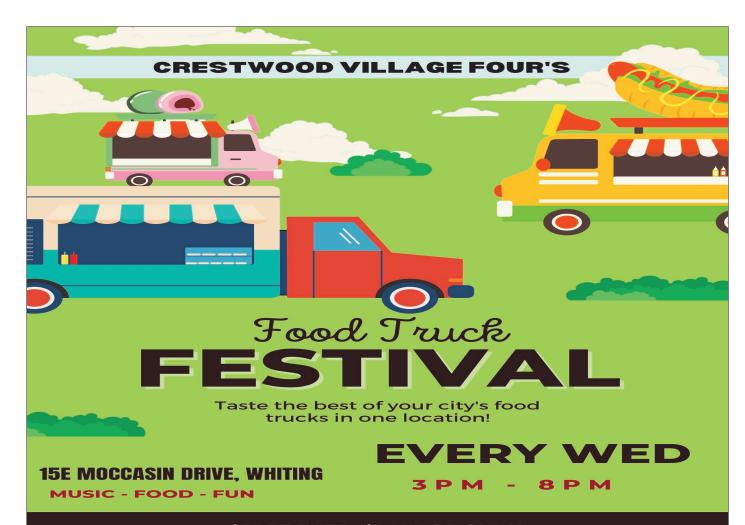

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# KIRMS PHOTOGRAPHY

Its summer time and a great time to get some shots at the beach and pool. On crowded beaches you can shoot the people, activities, and colorful umbrellas. On remote beaches you can look for wildlife, patterns in the sand, or great cloud formations against the water, There's always sunrise images early in the morning. Don't forget sunscreen and a hat!

The challenge with beach shots is getting the proper exposure. Your camera is designed to give you an average exposure of the entire scene. This is why most of your images are properly exposed. A very bright scene tricks you camera into thinking there is too much light, so the camera will cut back on exposure. To compensate you should increase the exposure slightly. If your camera has "scene" modes, use the one for snow or beach.

A great way to enhance your images is using a polarizing filter, which cuts glare the same as polarizing sunglasses. Many photographers use this filter to make the sky in their images darker (and the clouds brighter) but this filter works wonderfully to show the detail in the sand and to remove the

reflections in the water. This also works well for images around the pool.

### WHAT IS NJ'S REGISTER READY PROGRAM AND HOW DOES

IT WORK? The Ocean Township Office of Emergency Management participates in the state-wide registry for residents with Access and Functional needs. The Register Ready initiative is a voluntary and free program designed to assist first responders and emergency planners in identifying those residents that may need assistance in evacuating in advance of an emergency. It will also aid emergency planners in the development of shelter plans for those residents with Access and Functional Needs. NJ Register Ready has been established to collect information emergency responders will need to help locate and evacuate people with Access and Functional Needs during an emergency, when a family, caregiver or are unable to help them. The information collected is only accessible to emergency management and first responders. You (or someone on your behalf) should register if you may find it difficult to get to safety with family or friends or to a public shelter during an emergency evacuation, because of a physical or cognitive limitation, language barrier, or lack of transportation. Remember, your priority should be to relocate with a family member or friend first! You can register in any one of the following 3 ways: (1) Print and complete the Register Ready Form, which is located in the lobby of Independence Hall, and mail it to the Township of Ocean Office of Emergency Management, 50 Railroad Ave. Waretown, NJ 08758 (2) Call TOLL FREE 2-1-1 and register by telephone; TTY/TDD translation services also available. (3) to <a href="https://www13.state.nj.us/SpecialNeeds/Signin?">https://www13.state.nj.us/SpecialNeeds/Signin?</a> ReturnUrl=%2fSpecialNeeds%2f and complete registration. Your safety should always come first!

This month, given the smoke/fires situation and the prediction of more arid conditions yet to come, I thought it prudent to mention the idea of preparing a "Go Bag".

A Go Bag is a small backpack or overnight <u>bag</u> one keeps <u>packed</u> and ready to <u>GO</u>, should there be an evacuation or other emergency where we need to move fast. When this happens, it's not the time to stop to think about what you might need; it's time to get in the car with what you can grab on your way out the door. So here are some ideas on preparing your go bag, if you decide to do so.

You'll want your glasses; medications, including OTCs; matches in a sealed plastic bag; flashlight; cell phone AND CHARGER; a change of clothes (remember socks); identification and medical cards; any prescription info; your EpiPen if you need one; at least one water bottle per person, more if you can leave it in your vehicle; a sheet or blanket; rain gear, and of course money. I also have a folder handy with a photo copy of my Certificate with my homeowner insurance docs.

If you are a pet owner, think about keeping extra pet supplies, including meds, leash and harness, and at least one bowl along with pet's ID and Vet contact info in a separate pack. Lastly, check on your neighbors if you can. Help those who need it.

This is not intended to alarm anyone; indeed, my personal philosophy is: If you take your umbrella, it will not rain. This is my way of umbrellia-ing our beloved community. Being prepared never hurts!
