Crestwood Village IV introduced our new Mayor, Joseph Hankins, at a gathering on Thursday, April 24th. Along with the mayor we met Sgt. Robert Sharry and Ptl. Conner Yatauro of the Office of Emergency Management. Mayor Hankins, elected in January of this year, started his introduction by announcing what he would like to see in the Crestwood Village area – namely, new businesses. Additionally, he announced that three houses will be built strictly for purchase by Veteran(s).

The Mayor also addressed the electric supply issue – the consortium asked and received two bids from electric suppliers not currently used. These bids were higher than the current supplier. Additionally, he stated that there is no way to develop a power source. Heritage Minerals property will have a solar field installed once the new property owners cap the landfill. This process will be at no cost the residents.

The Mayor also met with the new President of JCP&L and was assured that the December transformer issues are being addressed with the repair of the transformer and a portable transformer on a trailer being kept on the property. According to JCP&L, no further problems are envisioned.

The Waretown Fire – last week, the fire burned over 16,000 acres and was still burning during the meeting, which allowed for a full discussion on how such a situation can be handled in Village IV (as well as the surrounding areas). First and foremost, we (residents) can clear area by area of dead branches, debris, etc. It was mentioned that we (CVIV residents) could volunteer to participate in a Village clean-up. The Board is going to actively search for individuals to help and the town would pick up the materials as needed.

The mayor stated that a new fire observation tower was built in Jackson to replace a Lakewood tower and that a new radio tower is in Roosevelt City.

Robert Sharry, OEM Coordinator and Conner Yatauro, Deputy OEM Coordinator, discussed preventative measures to control brush, ladder fuels, prescribed burns through the 2023 Community Wildfire Protection Plan. The Plan is a 10-year project initiated to reduce the possibility of wildfires. This includes risk assessments, shelter designations, plans for evacuation of incapacitated residents and pets. **During this discussion, it was reiterated that mulch must be removed from around our homes (18”). Shrubs covering windows were also addressed. Ingress/egress from residences must be available to fire and police members. The windows must be uncovered of all shrubbery.**

A very important piece of information passed along is the availability of **REGISTER READY**. This website is for those people who are incapacitated, unable to evacuate on their own, have medical equipment or are bedridden. **REGISTER READY ALLOWS FOR YOU TO REGISTER YOURSELF TO BE EVACUATED WITH ASSISTANCE IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY.** The staff contacts you by phone, yearly to confirm that you need to remain on the list. This program is well worth looking into and taking advantage of.

Additionally, another form of emergency information notification is NIXLE. Register on your phone with your address. This system will notify you if it is necessary to evacuate. (Comment from OEM: **don't evacuate unless you are asked to!**) They also talked about a “go-bag” – money, medicine, important documents, phone, phone charger, emergency contacts/phone numbers put in a bag in a safe place to grab in case of evacuation or other emergency event.

All in all, this was a VERY INFORMATIVE meeting and we thank the Mayor and members of the Office of Emergency Management for taking time out of their very busy schedules to address Crestwood Village IV's concerns. We certainly hope that the new Mayor has a safe and productive tenure.

In Manchester Township, it is generally prohibited to feed wild animals or feral cats, except as permitted by the [Trap-Neuter-Return \(TNR\) program](#) for feral cats. The [TNR program](#) has specific rules and regulations for feeding feral cats that are part of the program. Feeding wildlife is a violation of the ordinance, and penalties may apply. According to your Rules & Regulations, Section 4.8, "Food is NOT to be distributed, left for or given to stray, feral or loose animals. Bird feeders are permitted so long as they do not impede walkways or the ability to mow lawns, remove snow or provide other services. Setting traps of any type outdoors is prohibited."

Remember - "before going ahead with any plantings, keep in mind the common grounds including all the wooded and grassy areas among our residences are community property and not the property of the certificate holder. (Section 7.0). If you are in doubt about whether or not your planting will be consistent with these rules, residents are urged to submit a Planting Proposal which includes a diagram of the proposed planting. All bushes and flowers are the responsibility of the resident and are of no cost or responsibility to the Co-op. Trimming of bushes by the Co-op is chargeable." There are many residents who will be receiving letters in the mail and/or fines for not keeping your areas according to the Rules & Regulations. Keep your community clean.

Finally, as Summer rocks, company knocks...remind your company that there are parking rules in effect at CV4. There is no overnight street parking, vehicles will be towed. Additionally, when parked in the street, all tires must be on the street, there is no parking on the grass. "Each Certificate Owner in a multi-unit building with no garage (Madison, Essex, Windsor), is entitled to one (1) designated parking space. Each of those parking areas is equipped with two (2) guest spots...Guests, if no guest spot is available, may park their vehicle at the clubhouse. A visible note should be left in the windshield of the vehicle listing the owner's name, address where staying and phone number. **Certificate Holders may not use the guest spaces for their second vehicles.**" (During normal business hours you may obtain a temporary parking permit from the clubhouse). "

Photographing Baseball

It's baseball season and the Jersey Shore BlueClaws have started their season. If you enjoy shooting sports (one of my favorites) then take your camera to the stadium. They do not allow video and you cannot use a tripod. There are a few things you can do to increase your chances of a good shot.

A camera with a zoom lens will allow you to get closer to the play. Try to think ahead of the game to get prepared for the actions. For example, if there is a runner on first with less than two outs, there's a good chance there will be a play at second base, either a steal or double-play attempt. You can zoom in and focus on second base before the play starts so you're ready when the action happens. If you chase the ball around the field you probably won't get the best shots.

It can be fun to take images of the fans as well. There are always plenty of children enjoying a day at the stadium. Buster, the BlueClaws' mascot, and the stadium crew are always entertaining as well.
