History & The Founders

- **The famous date confusion:** Although we celebrate on July 4th, the Continental Congress actually voted to declare independence two days earlier on July 2, 1776. Furthermore, the document was not officially signed by all delegates until August 2, 1776.
- **The day two presidents died:** In a bizarre twist of fate, Founding Fathers and former U.S. Presidents John Adams and Thomas Jefferson both passed away on exactly the same day: July 4, 1826—the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence.

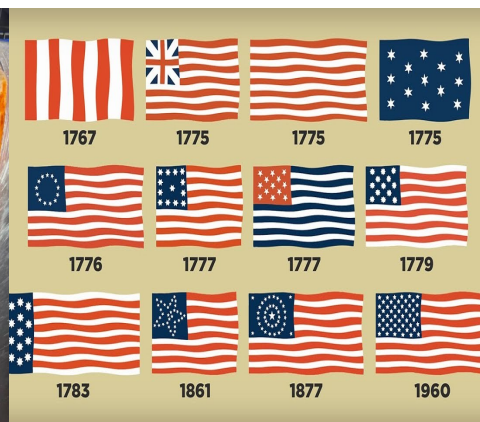
By the Numbers

- **155 million:** The number of hot dogs Americans are estimated to eat on this single holiday. That is enough franks to stretch from Los Angeles to Washington, D.C. five times over.
- **\$2.3+ billion:** The estimated spending on fireworks nationwide, according to the American Pyrotechnics Association.

2.5 million vs. 345+ million: The population of the newly formed United States in 1776 was about 2.5 million, compared to the present-day population.

Modern Trivia

- **The official 50-star flag:** The current U.S. flag was designed by a 17-year-old high school student named Robert G. Heft in 1958 as a school project. He initially received a B-minus, but his teacher promised to change it to an A if the design was adopted by Congress. It became the official flag in 1960.

PAINTING SCHEDULE

The Perfect Shade Painting has begun painting in the village. There are painted pieces of siding in the Clubhouse hallway near the Betsy Ross room to view the new color palette. Emails will be sent via Enumerate to the Community weekly to let you know what homes will be done that week as well as having the website updated

Day 1: The exterior of your unit will be power washed.

Day 2: Painter will return the next day to begin painting, **weather permitting**.

To ensure the painter can work efficiently and protect your belongings, please complete the following preparation steps before your scheduled week:

Clear the perimeter: Remove all personal items decorations, and furniture touching or near the unit exterior.

Trim landscaping: Cut back any shrubs, bushes, or tree branches that are touching or located too close to the building walls.

Maintaining Our Community's Financial Health

As members of a cooperative community, we all share a financial responsibility to one another. Our monthly fees aren't optional—they are the lifeblood of our village, funding everything from essential maintenance to the community services we all rely on.

When a member fails to pay their share, it places an unfair financial burden on the neighbors who do. Because the Board of Trustees is legally obligated to protect the financial integrity and long-term stability of our community, we are actively pursuing all outstanding balances. Our latest figures indicate just over \$400k in delinquent carrying charges.

Our current collection efforts include:

* **Rigorous Debt Collection:** We are actively pursuing all legal avenues to recover past-due balances from non-paying members.

* **Revocation of Certificates:** For accounts that remain severely delinquent despite repeated notices, the Board is moving forward with the process to revoke membership certificates. In a co-op, losing your certificate means losing your right to occupy the unit.

We prefer to work with our residents, and legal action is always a last resort. If you are experiencing a temporary financial hardship, please contact the office immediately, ask to speak with the Office Manager, so we can discuss potential payment arrangements before formal action is taken.

Thank you to the overwhelming majority of our residents who pay their dues on time every month. Your commitment ensures our community remains a beautiful, well-maintained, and vibrant place to live.

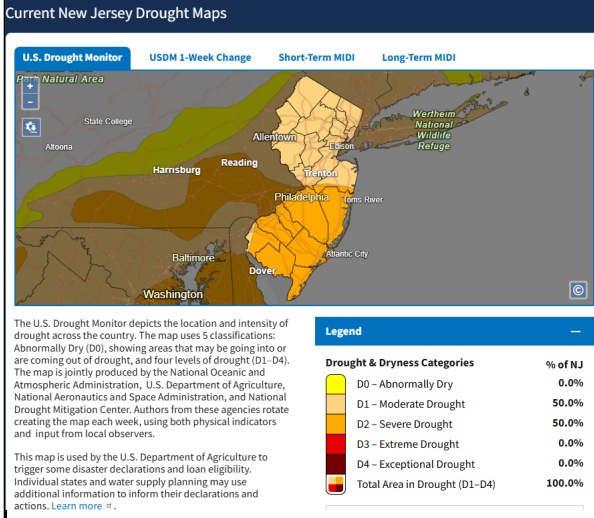

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With drought conditions stretching from coast-to-coast, many communities are heading into this summer with some form of water restrictions already in place. Swaths of the country are facing “extreme” to “exceptional” drought, according to a recent U.S. Drought Monitor map. The findings came as unusually warm conditions have taken hold, with the last year (May 2025 to April 2026) marking the warmest 12-month period on record for the contiguous U.S.

A SUMMER MESSAGE FROM GENERAL LANDSCAPING TO THE RESIDENTS OF CRESTWOOD VILLAGE 4

As the landscape maintenance contractor for Crestwood Village 4, we appreciate the opportunity to help maintain the community's lawns and grounds. With summer now here, we would like to share a few reminders that will help keep Crestwood Village 4 looking its best.

Please help us maintain safe mowing conditions by keeping lawn areas free of debris, sticks, toys, hoses, and other objects. Any rocks or stones that have migrated into the lawn should be returned to their landscape beds. Small stones can become projectiles when struck by mowing equipment and may cause damage to windows, vehicles, or other property.

We also ask that lawn ornaments, decorative items, and seasonal decorations be securely anchored, especially during spring and fall cleanup operations. Our commercial leaf blowers operate at high velocity, and unsecured items may be moved or damaged. General Landscaping cannot be responsible for damage to unsecured lawn ornaments or decorations.

Proper watering is especially important during the summer months. Healthy, well-watered turf not only looks better but also helps reduce dust and stress on the lawn.

Recommended Irrigation Guidelines:

- Fixed spray (stationary) sprinkler heads: 20–30 minutes per zone daily.
- If watering every other day, increase run times to approximately 30–40 minutes per zone.
- Rotary sprinkler heads: 45–50 minutes per zone.

These recommendations may be adjusted based on rainfall, temperatures, and site conditions.

ENUMERATE ENGAGE

At the end of April, residents who have e-mail addresses on file with us, received an email from Enumerate to sign up for Enumerate Engage. Enumerate is the software system we use for Accounting, Work Orders, messages to residents and so much more. We are constantly updating and learning best ways to communicate with the residents so there are multiple platforms to give information.

Some of the benefits of using this system are:

- Homeowner workflow (work orders, violation notices, Modifications, etc.)
- Group pages—Can start a private community page with neighbors
- Photo galleries— Add a pic to your profile
- Community feed—Get messages from the Office that effect the community immediately
- Payment portal—Make a 1 time payment, set up reoccurring payments, change ACH information. \$13 fee for credit card payment, no charge to pay with current ACH bank information
- Owner delivery preferences—Add Household Acct to grant a family member access to your account so they are also notified about account balances, notifications, etc. Also, sign up for Text messages (Acct—Settings— Notifications—Preferences)

We invite those residents who do not have e-mail address with us to fill out the Emergency Contact Information form and update your information. Invitations to join the portal will be sent via email the next business day after the system updates.

There is a Support & Feedback page on the site to talk directly with Engage on any issues as well as a FAQ page. Sign up, look around and find a whole new way to stay up to date with your account.

You need to accept and enroll to receive emails from the office.

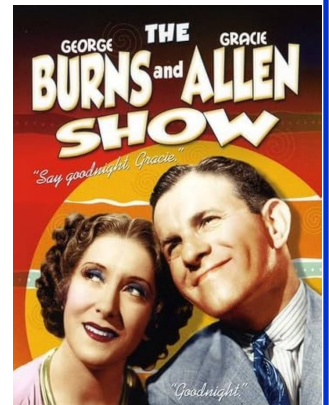
